From Our Policy Chair Joy Frew

The Public Policy Committee of the State AAUW reviewed the ballot measures and determined that most do not address issues in our Public Policy Priorities. We have classified those as "No Position." Propositions 1, 4, and 5 have a bearing on our principles, but they include elements that undermine some of our priorities along with elements that support our priorities. The Committee adopted a "Neutral" position on Propositions 1, 4, and 5.

Prop 1: **Veterans and Affordable Housing Bond** – NEUTRAL Authorizes \$4 billion in general obligation bonds to build and preserve affordable homes for veterans and aid veterans in purchasing a farm, home or mobile home. While AAUW priorities do not address issues specifically related to veterans, we do support affordable housing for low income families and many veterans are women. A negative aspect of the measure is that general obligation bonds are paid for from the state's General Fund, where money is needed for schools, health care, other housing programs and state services.

Prop 2: **Homeless Housing Bond** – SUPPORT No Place Like Home Act of 2018. Over 130,000 Californians are homeless. A great number of our homeless population suffers from mental illness. Prop 2 allows the use of previously allocated unspent money to be used to provide permanent supportive housing for people who need mental health services and are either currently homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Women comprise a significant percentage of the homeless. This measure does not involve a new state bond.

Prop 4: **Children's Hospital Bond** – NEUTRAL Prop 4 would use \$1.5 billion in general obligation bond money to support 5 children's hospitals in the University of California system and other public and private hospitals that serve children. The bond money would be used for construction, expansion, renovation, and equipment projects. On the one hand, this measure supports health care services to children. On the other hand, the use of state funds to support private facilities diverts money from public projects, such as schools.

Prop 5: **Property Tax** – NEUTRAL Proposition 5 would amend Proposition 13 (1978) in the State Constitution to allow homebuyers who are age 55 or older or severely disabled to transfer the tax-assessed value from their prior home to their

new home, no matter (a) the new home's market value; (b) the new home's location in the state; or (c) the number of moves. This measure would assist some older or disabled women when they change residences. However, seniors already are able to retain their property tax base when they move within set parameters – Prop 5 expands that program. The Legislative Analyst states that this would reduce state revenues from property taxes by up to \$1 billion per year. Property taxes are the major source of funding for schools and local services.

... and policy issues from the State AAUW:

Stand Up for Equity in Education: Tell Your Legislators to Co-sponsor GEEA!

In the 46 years since its enactment, Title IX has opened doors for girls and women from classrooms to the playing fields. But despite tremendous progress, challenges to equity in education still exist. That's why Sen. Mazie Hirono (D-HI) and Rep. Doris Matsui (D-CA) recently reintroduced the **Patsy T. Mink and Louise M. Slaughter Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA) of 2018** to ensure schools and educational institutions comply with this landmark civil rights law.

At a time when the U.S. Department of Education has <u>taken action</u> to roll back Title IX protections for students, GEEA would help address sex discrimination in all areas of education by:

- Providing additional resources, training, and technical assistance to educational entities in order to ensure compliance with Title IX.
- Establishing an Office of Gender Equity in the U.S. Department of Education to coordinate activities within the Department and among other federal agencies.
- Supporting the work of thousands of Title IX coordinators by providing annual training and technical assistance.
- Authorizing competitive grants to K-12 schools, colleges, local educational agencies, or states to support their gender equity work.

Sex discrimination has no place in our schools. Urge your members of Congress to stand up for equity in education by cosponsoring GEEA.


AAUW's 2018–2019 fellowships and grants awardees

AAUW's fellowships and grants is celebrating 130 years of helping scholars and activists like Ghadeer Dawwas overcome barriers to their education and advancement. Recipients have become leaders in business, government, academia, community activism, the arts, and the sciences.

For the 2018–2019 academic year, 250 women and community projects serving women and girls will receive \$3.9 million from AAUW. This level of funding for women's education and projects has a tremendous impact on women and their communities by expanding women's potential and supporting their future promise.

By easing the pressure of financing academic and community work, AAUW's awards help women tackle the growing burden of student debt and focus their efforts on the task at hand: developing the skills and experience they need to excel in their fields and lead innovative community projects to empower women and girls.

Empowerment through Empathy: The Birth of the Me-Too Movement

In October 2017, the #MeToo movement exploded on Twitter. Within weeks it had permeated social media, major news outlets, and everyday life, fueled by survivors of <u>sexual assault and harassment</u> who had finally found an outlet that let them speak their truths and know they weren't alone in their experiences. Some would say that the movement was born from a single tweet—but social justice activist <u>Tarana Burke</u> (above) can tell you that the movement started years before that.

Burke, who addressed a crowd of nearly 800 students at the 2018 <u>National</u> <u>Conference for College Women Student Leaders</u>, began her social justice career early. At 14 she joined an organization called the <u>21st Century Youth Leadership</u> <u>Movement</u>, which was founded by veterans of the civil rights and labor movements of the 1960s and 1970s. In high school she organized activist events and walkouts, and in college a protest after Rodney King was beaten by Los Angeles police during his arrest in 1991. Her work on fighting injustice until then had been based mostly around race, economics, and politics, but her focus evolved when she moved to Selma, Alabama, to work for 21st Century as a camp director.

#MeToo Next Steps: Closing the Gender Leadership Gap

<u>Career Development</u> With the majority of leadership positions still held by men, how can the workforce be a fair playing field?

The #MeToo movement showed not just the power and necessity of women's voices. But what about when those voices are absent in the very rooms where top decisions are made? How can responses to issues of harassment and discrimination be truly robust if diverse voices were not included in the decision-making process? A next step in the #MeToo movement must be to address the absence of women at top leadership roles in business, politics and education.

Startling stats

Women are half the population, yet:

- Women currently make up 20 percent of Congress and 25 percent of state legislatures with only six women serving as governors of their respective states.
- While women are 45 percent of the overall S&P 500 labor force, they hold only 27 percent of executive- and senior-level positions, 21 percent of board seats and 5 percent of Fortune 500 CEO jobs.
- Leadership opportunities are even more elusive for women of color, who make up only 7 percent of Congress, 6 percent of state legislatures, and hold only one governorship. Women of color are only <u>5 percent</u> of executive- and senior-level officials and managers, and only two women of color currently serve as CEOs of Fortune 500 companies.

The leadership gender gap will only persist if we do nothing. There are many steps we can take as individuals, employers and policy makers to create significant change.

Needed change

Employers can implement policies that help workers with work-life balance, including equal pay for equal work, paid parental leave and paid sick days. Diversity should be at the forefront in initial hiring as well as promotions to management; employers can work toward it by holding blind screenings, implementing regular diversity training, eliminating asking for salary history and creating mentorship and leadership programs aimed at moving more women and people of color into leadership roles. It's also good practice to implement leadership as well as salary audits to see where women and people of color sit at every level of management including board representation. The #MeToo movement showed not just the power and necessity of women's voices. But what about when those voices are absent in the very rooms where top decisions are made?

Lawmakers can support legislation that would promote women leaders through pay equity, family support and salary transparency. It's also important for all of us to have access to valuable data showing the number of women and people in color in leadership positions so that we can identify the gaps and come up with common sense solutions to close them. These are policies that put workers on a level playing field and aid women as they navigate their careers.

But the focus on women in leadership isn't just in the private sector. Encourage and support women running for office so that we can have leadership in the halls of Congress, state legislatures and White House that is more representative of our country.

At AAUW, we're committed to providing tools to help women accomplish their goals. That's why we're training 10 million women by 2022 to negotiate their salaries and benefits throughout every level of their careers, using our salary negotiation workshops. While you can't negotiate around discrimination, these trainings empower women to get the pay and standing they deserve. We also offer leadership training to women at every stage, from college through every rung of the career ladder.

Gender equality in every industry benefits everyone. It's good for families who increasingly rely on women as sole breadwinners. It's good for society to shatter cultural stereotypes surrounding leadership. It's good for business to draw on the creativity of a diverse staff and recognize the purchasing power of women. And finally, it's good for the country since the more diverse the pool, the more talented our leaders will be.

Relation all brook AAUW has been working for many years with programs that benefit the middle and high school young women in our community. We now have the opportunity to stretch our imaginations and work with the younger kids in the community. Here's a letter from Joe Kniseley, Principal of the newly designated Fallbrook STEM Academy:

Fallbrook Street School has been renamed and is being rebranded as *Fallbrook STEM Academy*. Below is a list of the seven reasons why Fallbrook STEM Academy is unique. One of those reasons is that we are intentional about building relationships and partnerships with the community. We have designated one hour a week called Bobcat Block where we invite community members to work with our students on STEM-related lessons and projects. Bobcat Block is broken into 4-week increments so a session can last 4 weeks, 8 weeks or 12 weeks depending on the program. The sessions can focus on art, science, technology, engineering, math, and/or social entrepreneurship. We would love for members of AAUW to partner with us to help provide these enrichment classes for our students.
