JOINT MEETING WITH TEMECULA VALLEY SATURDAY, MARCH 13, 2021 AT 10:30 AM

ZOOM MEETING

Although Temecula Valley and Fallbrook branches cannot gather in person this year, we shall continue with our tradition of having a joint meeting in March. The speaker, AAUW Fellow Amie Campos, will tell us about her dissertation research on the dynamics of frontier settlement and colonization in Chile during the late 19th century. Using national, regional, and local archives in Chile, she traces how Chile, represented by engineers and government bureaucrats, developed and enacted its visions of economic progress through land-redistribution projects. It's a great opportunity to compare Chile's experience with the American experience.

Further, Amie wishes to talk about how AAUW has helped her this past year. Amie was born and raised in Los Angeles. She received her BA from UCLA where she studied history, political science, and Scandinavian literature. She is a doctoral candidate at the University of California San Diego Department of History and a former Fulbright Fellow. Amie's goal is to publish her research in an academic journal and begin working on a book manuscript. When she's not reading, she enjoys baking and watching comedies on Netflix.

How about if we each recall some bit of information we learned in history/civics class and compare it to what Kreitner says about it, whether it's substantiated or blown out of the water.


