of our dear friend Betty Gilby

In December 2017, Betty fell and broke her neck. Everyone was very concerned. I visited Betty in the Escondido nursing The brace around her neck uncomfortable. She couldn't move. She wanted to go home. Some said she'd never be able to do that.

One day I took her a basket of different kinds of dark chocolate. There were dark chocolate covered nuts, candy bars, covered cranberries, and packs of Trader Joe's. When she was discharged, she and I credited that to all the dark chocolate, and she was so happy to get home.

After she was home, she loved the days I stopped in to visit and brought her dark chocolate or flowers. I think my car was on auto-pilot when it saw Waxflower Street. Sometimes I stopped just to chat. And she really enjoyed the days I stopped at the Yogurt Palace and showed up with chocolate and vanilla yogurt.

One day she told me she was bored: "nobody calls me." I suggested she get her phone book and call a friend. We paged through the book and called one of her friends. They chatted for a while. I suggested she have an assignment to call one person every day. I don't think she did!

Years ago, I told her I would like to buy some of her art. She was delighted. Many of her paintings were packed away and she enjoyed going through boxes. She pulled most of her paintings out in the living room so I could shop. I fell in love with the one of a 3–4-year girl walking on the beach. That little girl looked like my daughter, Jessica, and her daughter Sienna. This painting is my hallway, so I see it every day. She told me the story of the painting. She was at Oceanside Beach and took the pictures of kids playing in the sand and later painted them. I bought the painting of the girl. Later I bought the one of other kids on the beach. Now I think about all my grandkids when I walk down the hall. I have other paintings as well: For my 70th birthday I received a painting of a quail, and I bought another at a Mah Jong tournament.

Now when I drive by Waxflower, I think of the many years of stopping in several days of week. And I miss that.

Betty spent her entire life learning. One of her greatest pleasures was taking classes that taught her to write – both prose and poetry. Here's an example of a poem she wrote on turning 90.

I'm ninety years old New knee replaced Cataracts gone Let me make my mark Let the party start

At ninety, life is good. I marvel, revel, rejoice For friends, family, fun.

At ninety life is good I feast At friend's funerals I dine alone



Legislative Updates

Our last three priority bills that were awaiting the Governor's signature have been acted on, here are the results

SB 62 (requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment workers) SIGNED

AB 367 (free menstrual products must be provided in girls/women's bathrooms in schools) SIGNED

AB 887 (allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically) SIGNED

END THE STUDENT DEBT CRISIS

Women hold two-thirds (\$929 billion) of the country's \$1.46 trillion student debt. As a nation, we rely on women to add to and strengthen our economy. That can't happen under mountains of student debt. AAUW Board Summary - October 6, 2021

The meeting was held at Margie Mosavi's home.

Correspondence Secretary: Kathy Bierbrauer reported that many cards and phone calls were given to members who were dealing with health issues during September and beginning October. *Please note that Betty Gilby recently passed away. AAUW members who knew and worked with Betty will be invited to provide memory stories.*

Membership: Carlene Friesen provided a report of current new and potential members. Presently there are 50 members for Fallbrook AAUW. The board was given the names of the eight new members and contact information. Carlene encouraged the board to follow and include new members in committees, meeting set-up and new activities that are developed. We are also prompted to invite former mentees, scholarship recipients, and Tech Trek participants to come to meetings, to give an update, and consider membership when it is age appropriate.

Treasurer's Report: Elizabeth Leader reported we have \$9315 in the checking account and \$29,087 in savings for a total of \$38,403. Note: Phyllis Austin Heaton gave \$1.00 per book sold at the October 2nd presentation. This adds \$30.00 to our account. Additionally, a basket prepared by Sharon Robinson, which was auctioned at the September meeting, netted \$50.

Mentorship Program: Karen Langer Baker reported that there are 16 mentees. There are more mentors available than mentees. Some are requesting a mentor but have not yet had the Covid vaccine. The Mentee Christmas party is scheduled for December 18th.

Tech Trek: State AAUW is still investigating if Tech Trek will be an in-person activity for summer, 2022. Margie reported from the Inter-branch Council that it is still too early to predict what the Covid restrictions might be and if the USD campus would be available. An in-person registration fee is suggested at \$1500.

Programs for Monthly Meetings: Susan Duling and Carolyn Thom gave a program update. November $\underline{6}$ – Robin Douglas from the Oceanside Museum on Women Artists and Architects, both well-known and others. The presentation will be at the Wellness Center in Fallbrook

December 12 - Christmas party featuring a Roaring '20s theme.

<u>January 8, 2021</u> – Carole Hodges will present her newly published book, *Menopause Millionaire* at the Fallbrook Wellness Center. This is a joint meeting with Temecula AAUW.

<u>February 5</u> – Joy Frew presents Public Policy and AAUW at the Palomares House, Fallbrook.

Other Business and Reports

Margie Mosavi reported on the **Inter-branch Council (IBC) meeting**. Note: Saturday, January 29th is the SOCAL meeting for all AAUW branches. It will be held at Shadow Ridge in Vista from 10:30 to 1:30 and includes lunch and a speaker. More details to follow. The report included a Tech Trek update, reported earlier. The State AAUW reported that \$800,000 was given in scholarships statewide. Note that the total amount also includes corporate sponsorships. Many Colleges and Universities have not renewed their affiliate sponsorships for AAUW in San Diego County. Only California State University San Marcos (CSUSM) maintains its affiliation.

Elizabeth Leader reported on a webinar, **Care and Feeding of Volunteers**, which featured engaging people and membership renewal.







AAUW AVID's female astronaut "scarecrow," which was standing in front of Denny's Restaurant on Main Avenue at Fallbrook Street, went missing sometime Sunday, leaving only the sign on the easel. The astronaut was built by FUHS AAUW AVID girls in conjunction with Fallbrook Village's first annual "Scarecrow Days." She was standing with the American flag, while holding a friendly extraterrestrial. AVID coordinator, Karen Langer Baker, left, and the originator of the scarecrow's design, Chris Assad, right, placed her in the grass along the street where passersby could be inspired by their message: "AVID Women Can!"

Fallbrook Scarecrow Days, Part 1 By Nancy Heins Glaser

his is a brief story of Fallbrook Scarecrow Days (FSD), how the scarecrow frenzy began in Fallbrook, and how members of the local American Association of University Women (AAUW) Branch jumped on board. Since the inception of FSD, brought to town by Jackie Heyneman in 2012, there have been changes and tweaks to the fun throughout the Village. Everyone got increasingly interested in the fun—but challenging—nature of making the scarecrows, and the event celebration called Harvest Faire has grown in popularity.

Jackie Heyneman and several other Fallbrookians saw the idea of scarecrows being displayed at Halloween in the mid-coast California town of Cambria. Cambria started with historic figures and has shifted a bit to expand their creative talents to make life-sized figures from nursery rhymes, film, and theater. They aren't your mother's scarecrows!

Fallbrook's Scarecrow efforts was led by Heyneman and a group affectionately referred to as "The Scarecrew." The first year it was a band of only a few women who also established an event called

Harvest Faire to be a wraparound event to draw attention to our area businesses and celebrate local shopping to bring people to the downtown retail area. The Harvest Faire continues to this day, after being taken over by the Fallbrook Chamber of Commerce. The intent was to celebrate with each other showing the best that small town has to offer; and it worked. Harvest Fair has expanded in its offerings and reach for the last 10 years. Celebrating local products and small-town camaraderie has been held in October each year.

After hearing historian Anne Hoiberg Anne describe the history behind Marie Curie's Nobel Prize-



winning research funded in part by AAUW, scientist Marie Curie was recommended as a first in the new series of AAUW scarecrows, starting in 2016.

The widely-recognized artist (Fallbrookian and AAUW member) BJ Lane agreed to create the face of a first realistic "ghostly" likeness of Curie. Other more-experienced members of The Scarecrew helped with body construction, costuming, and other attributes for improving the look, sturdiness, and artistry of each scarecrow. The Regular Scarecrew

members actually begin making Papier Mache heads and constructing wooden frames as soon as the prior year's Scarecrow Days are complete. The goal is to reach more businesses and encompass the entire

business community which in Fallbrook is widely spread in three major business districts: East Mission, Mission, and South Mission Roads.

Although Marie Curie was tied directly to AAUW, other interesting women scarecrows were created as well: Frida Kahlo followed as designed by creative Deluz resident Gina Abdelrahman. She had support from AAUW members and the Scarecrew in crafting a flamboyant, larger-than-life rolling version still seen at The Fallbrook Art Center.



Next came Ruth Bader Ginsberg, with Abdelrahman creating her larger-than-life face, with AAUW mentees and mentors helping

to cut and glue words "Notorious RBG" and "Super Diva" on her black judge's robe, with one hand holding a gavel and another a weight, as she had been featured on workout videos with a latenight talk show comedian.

The scarecrows have also traveled away from Fallbrook "participating" in an exhibit in Pomona (at the Latina Museum) thanks also to Lane. "Rolling Frida" and two other versions of

Frida by Abdelrahman (Emotional Frida AND Frida REAL)) were representatives in an exhibit honoring Frida. They have returned to serve Fallbrook another day.
