Women We Should Know About:

Eight Women Astronomers

[A guided tour of selected luminaries of astronomy from Ancient Greece to today](#)

Andrea Ghez, a professor of physics and astronomy at UCLA, shared the 2020 Nobel Prize in physics for finding a supermassive black hole stuffed with 4 million suns at the center of our galaxy. Among the four female Nobel Laureates in physics to date, Ghez is the only astronomer. Her award is a pinnacle for women in astronomy and astrophysics. Yet women astronomers remain a minority and often encounter a lack of recognition, unwelcoming career paths, and harassment. But today women participate and publish in astronomy and astrophysics at higher rates than in physics overall, producing world-class research.



Caroline Herschel began her life in astronomy supporting the work of her brother William. She was working with him when they discovered Uranus. She became the world's first professional woman astronomer, her salary provided by King George III of Great Britain. Working as a team, William and Caroline Herschel increased the number of known nebulae from about 100 to 2500.

Maya Angelou becomes first black woman to appear on U.S. quarter as Treasury begins distribution

The Maya Angelou quarter is the first in the American Women Quarters Program, which will include coins featuring prominent women in American history. Other quarters in the series will begin rolling out later this year and through 2025.

“Each time we redesign our currency, we have the chance to say something about our country—what we value, and how we've progressed as a society,” Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said in a separate statement. “I'm very proud that these coins celebrate the contributions of some of America's most remarkable women, including Maya Angelou.”



Lawmakers cheered the release of the new coin and credited Rep. Barbara Lee, a California Democrat, with the achievement. Lee introduced the Circulating Collectible Coin Redesign Act of 2020, which passed in January 2021 and ultimately paved the way for the creation of these new coins.

The agency will issue four other quarters this year, with the others honoring Sally Ride, an astronaut who was the first American woman in space; Asian-American actress Anna May Wong; Cherokee Nation leader Wilma Mankiller; and suffragist and politician Nina Otero-Warren.

Russian editor hero...

Marina Ovsyannikova, an editor at Russia's state-run Channel One television station, burst onto the set of the live nightly news broadcast tonight shouting "Stop the war. No to war." She held a sign reading: "Don't believe the propaganda. They're lying to you here." It was signed in English: "Russians against the war." Through a Russian human rights group, OVD-Info, she also released a pre-recorded video statement in which she stated: "What is happening in Ukraine is a crime. And Russia is the aggressor here. And responsibility for this aggression rests on the conscience of a single man: Vladimir Putin. My father is Ukrainian. My mother is Russian. And they've never been enemies. And this necklace I'm wearing is a symbol of that fact that Russia must immediately end this fratricidal war. She was arrested shortly after and could be sentenced to 15 years in prison. She has since been accused of being a British spy.

MY SISTER'S KEEPER SUCCESS INSTITUTE, INC

As a trustee of the Fallbrook High School District, I was invited to join a trustee group from Riverside County. One of our speakers, Kristin Newsome, really got my attention. She is the founder and executive director of [MY SISTER'S KEEPER INSTITUTE](#) dedicated to assist and introduce girls of color to STEAM/STEM careers. This nonprofit organization was started by Ms. Newsom in 2018 because her daughter was getting so much resistance toward her science degree goal. So, with her degree in Psychology and decades of coaching experience she started this organization in nearby Temecula.

This group inspires girls in underrepresented groups, ages 10–17 to be confident, bold world changers through personal empowerment mentoring toward STEAM careers. Their web site is fabulous, showing various weekend workshops, field trips and summer camps, some free and others with a nominal fee. I was fortunate to speak to Ms. Newsome on the phone and found our discussion about their activities and internships to be so interesting.

I like what Ms. Newsome said about economic sustainability and how STEAM leads the way for the higher-paying careers. She said that we need to encourage black and brown girls to consider going into these fields. She mentioned a study of Girls Pursuing Science from 2012. It showed that white women earned 6777 PhDs in STEAM fields while men earned 8478 PhD degrees. For African American women, that number dwindles to 684, ten times fewer scientific doctorates than their white counterparts. And, with only 3.5% of STEAM bachelor's degrees, Latinas face an even larger obstacle. Therefore, changing this requires support, commitment from parents, board members and advocates to see that change happen.

Her group of volunteers is clearly working on making a difference for the girls in Temecula who have been guided to this program. As the Diversity Chair of AAUW, Fallbrook, I urge any of you who are interested to Google MY SISTER'S KEEPER INSTITUTE and tell me what you think about this program. Contact me if it gives you any ideas for the girls that we mentor.


