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## Proposed Changes to AAUW Bylaws

From April 3rd through May 15 at 12 noon EST, National AAUW is asking us to vote FOR or AGAINST their proposal to change the bylaws to create open membership, thus eliminating any and all restrictions to full membership in AAUW. This means that anyone who supports AAUW's goals and mission to support diversity, equity, and inclusion can join AAUW as full members.

#### Important AAUW HISTORY:

At its inception, AAUW restricted membership acceptance to those who had earned a full college degree from its list of accredited colleges or universities. Eventually, acceptance was expanded according to cultural changes.

- Prior to the 1940s, only a small list of accredited schools existed;
- During the 1940s, all accredited schools were added;
- In 1963, the fields of education, home economics, and nursing were added;
- In 1987, men were added;
- In 2005, the degree requirement changed to Associate of Arts or Science or its equivalent (2 year degree).

At our meeting, I summarized AAUW's reasons for proposing a change to our bylaws. After hearing and reading some members' objections, I summarized those as well.

#### ARGUMENTS IN FAVOR OF ELIMINATING QUALIFICATIONS

#### According to National AAUW:

"Fewer people require college degrees today. By eliminating the degree requirement, we appeal to younger, and nondegreed, people who support our mission of equity for all."

#### According to AAUW California:

"We can change and keep strongly rooted in our commitment to higher education as a path to success as well as our support for fellowships and grants. This change allows those who have taken parallel educational paths to join our work for gender equity."

According to comments made by a member:

"We are seen as exclusive and elitist when we espouse diversity, equity, and inclusion but exclude lesser-educated people from membership."

# ARGUMENTS AGAINST ELIMINATING QUALIFICATIONS

(AAUW National gave none, as they are proposing the changes)

According to comments made by some members:

"Enrollment did not increase when men were added, so it's not guaranteed that more young and non-degreed people will join."

"An 'AA degree or equivalent' has also meant that people with business experience have already qualified despite having no degree."

"College students who currently join as 'student associates' for considerably lower membership fees would now lose that option, and would only be able to join as full members at full fee."

"We could have an associate membership similar to our current student associates for all people who support our mission, regardless of lack of educational or business qualifications, for a lower fee."

## Strategic Planning

The Fallbrook AAUW Board held a meeting at Patty Carlson's home to review how the year is progressing and to focus on what we are doing well and what may still be considered. Here are the questions that were addressed and the responses.

1. What are our *Main Event* activities?

Programs aligned with our Mission Statement include Public Policy, DEI, Tech Trek, and educational programs with women speakers at our monthly meetings. Fundraising opportunities include the December Red Stocking Event, the annual meeting in May, a fundraising event, and monthly opportunity baskets. Our target population of young women are engaged through the speech contest (Consider also State Speech Trek and Fallbrook Rotary involvement), the Mentorship Program, Tech Trek, and the Scholarship Program.

- 2. What, how, and where are the branch's activities, programs, projects recorded for our history? Events, such as the December Holiday Event and Red Stocking Event need to have a recorded history of set-up, contacts, and cost. This summary could be recorded and kept (in a notebook.) At the summer strategic planning meeting previous and new officers and chairwomen could meet and confer to pass on the activities and responsibilities of the new position. Our vision can be expanded to appeal to younger women. There was a stated need to record minutes, newsletters, and other meetings, such as strategic planning and fundraisers in the Google platform set up for AAUW. A limited number of members are aware of and can access this program. The AAUW website is updated regularly. Members need to be aware of our website and how it can be used to record our history.
- 3. How can we be more visible in the community?

Select general meetings topics to interest prospective members. Consider the Chamber activities – have a booth at the EXPO. Have a library event. Determine programs that would be of interest to younger women (in their 20s–50s). For example, we could set up one or a series of talks or interactive no-cost seminars dealing with financial management by connecting with the Fallbrook Chamber of Commerce. These programs could be at the chamber, library, or FPUD. Promotion of events could include flyers given out at meetings and posted at the library.

4. Scholarships have been given to large numbers (10 and 11) of young women the last couple of years. Should larger amounts be given to fewer applicants or stay this pattern?

General responses were to continue with a large number of scholarship recipients to encourage more young women to attend college. Reminder, many other organizations support scholarships, and some for individuals are large sums of money.
